

Frequently Asked Questions

Q. How do people qualify?

A. Generally, one must be living in a nursing home and receiving Medicaid.

Q. Can people choose not to participate?

A. Yes, participation is completely voluntary.

Q. If someone chooses to participate, can he/she return to the nursing home?

A. In most cases, yes. Certain exceptions apply.
