



Hospital Attestation to Resume or Continue Providing Non-Emergent or Elective Procedures

On April 27, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Order 20-22, that allowed hospitals to resume non-emergent or elective procedures, by May 1, 2020 at the earliest, if a hospital is in compliance with Oregon Health Authority (OHA) guidance. [OHA guidance](#) requires hospitals to have adequate personal protective equipment (PPE) on hand, implement and sustain a certain level of PPE use guidelines and to attest to OHA that the hospital meets these standards.¹

This attestation form must be signed by an individual with legal authority to act on behalf of the hospital or health system.

- As a large hospital (as defined in OHA guidance), the hospital has an adequate 30-day supply of medical grade PPE that meets applicable National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health and U.S. Food and Drug Administration regulations on hand that is appropriate to the number and type of procedures to be performed or an open supply chain, as that is defined in OHA's guidance.
- As a small hospital (as that is defined in OHA guidance), the hospital has an adequate 14-day supply of medical grade PPE that meets applicable National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health and U.S. Food and Drug Administration regulations that is appropriate to the number and type of procedures to be performed on hand or an open supply chain, as that is defined in OHA's guidance.
- The hospital or hospitals within the health system implements and sustains conventional strategies, Tier 1 or Tier 2 PPE contingency capacity strategies for PPE usage guidelines as detailed in OHA and Oregon Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OR-OSHA)'s [Interim Guidance: Use of Personal Protective Equipment by Healthcare Personnel in Resource-Constrained Settings](#). The hospital or hospitals within the health system only uses Tier 2 PPE contingency

capacity standards if conventional strategies and Tier 1 PPE contingency strategies are not sustainable. Engineering and administrative control measures are or will be fully implemented to the extent possible before implementing PPE contingency capacity strategies.

- As a health system, PPE supplies on hand were calculated at a health system level and the PPE requirements described above and the OHA guidance can be met for each of the hospitals within the health system listed below.
